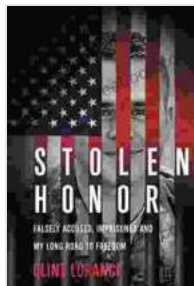

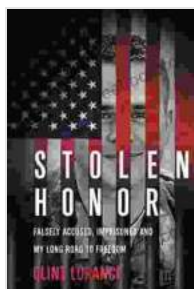

- Get involved in your community and work to create a more just and equitable society.

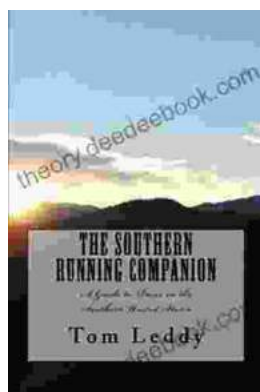
Together, we can make a difference. We can create a world where innocent people are not wrongfully convicted and where justice prevails.



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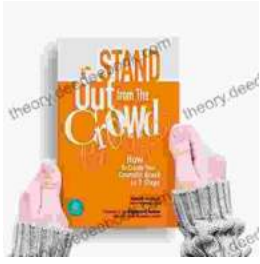
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
