

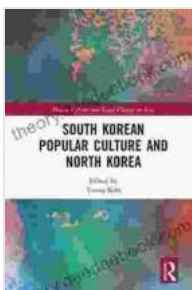

## **Emergence of a Black Market**

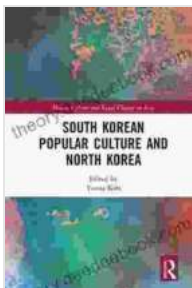
The government's crackdown on illegal media has fostered a thriving black market where citizens can purchase and trade these forbidden materials. This network has become a platform for information exchange and limited
