
The Washingtons: A Legacy of Leadership in the Presidential Branch



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
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Second Generation: Lawrence Washington (1659-1698)

Lawrence Washington, the eldest son of John Washington


Third Generation: Augustine Washington (1694-1743)





Robert E. Lee, the commander of the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia during the American Civil War


