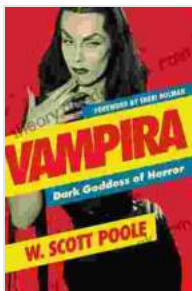


Vampira: The Dark Goddess of Horror

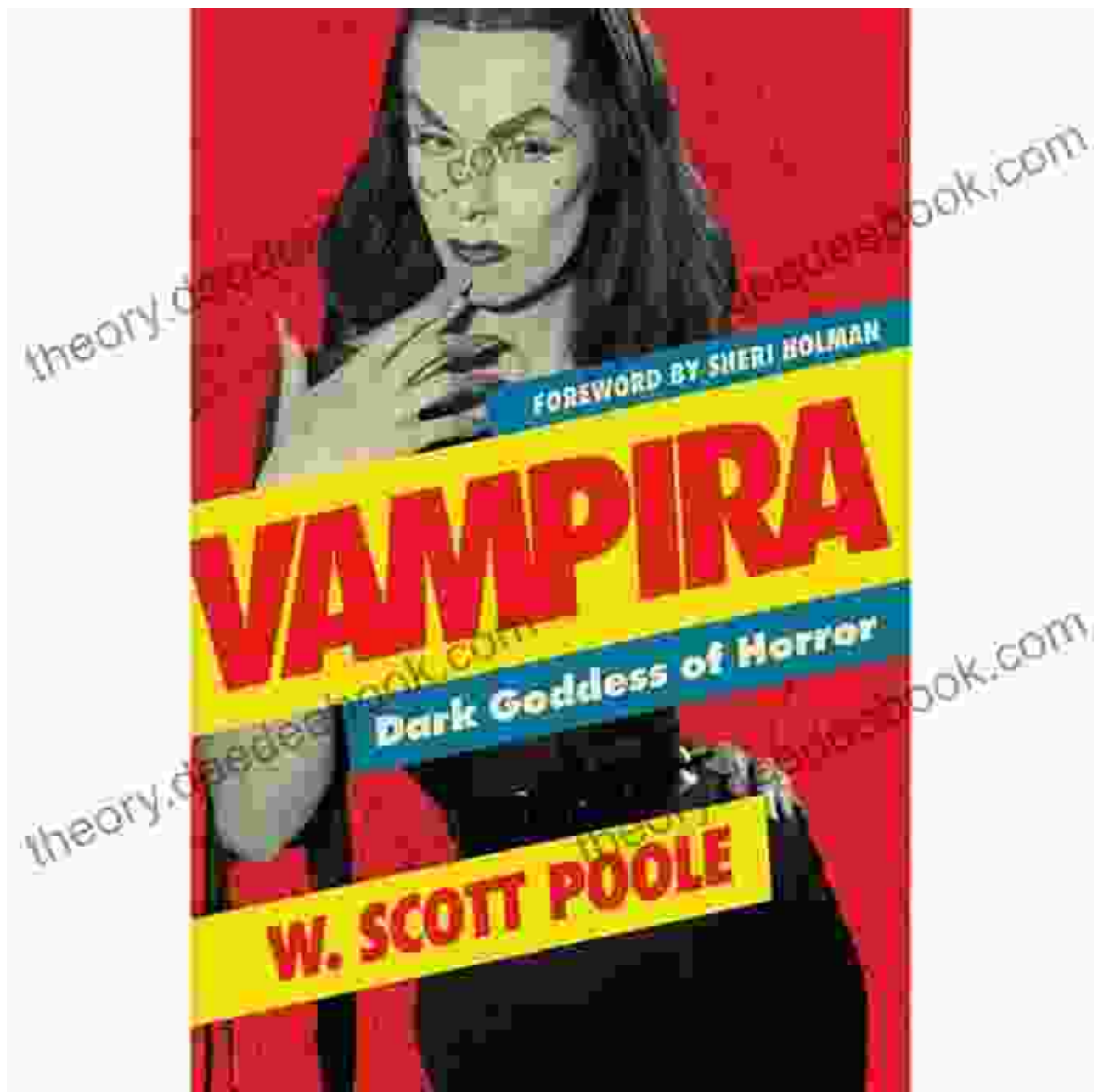

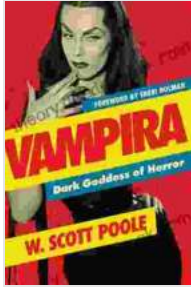
